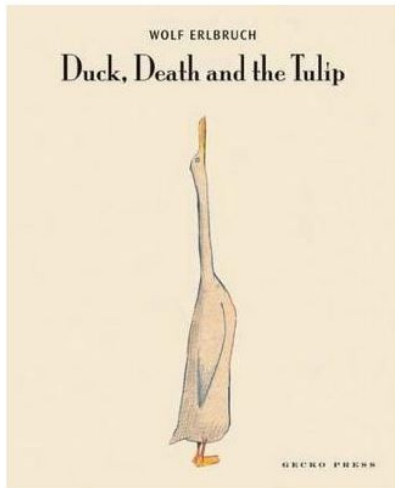

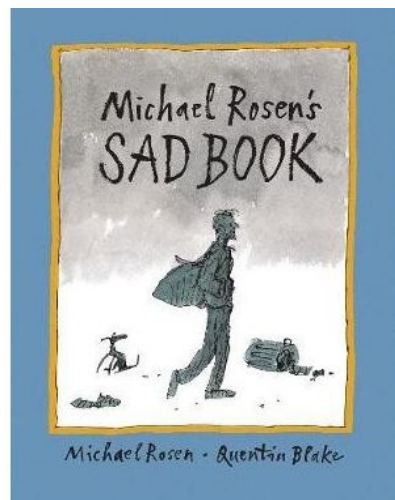
Death, Duck and the Tulip

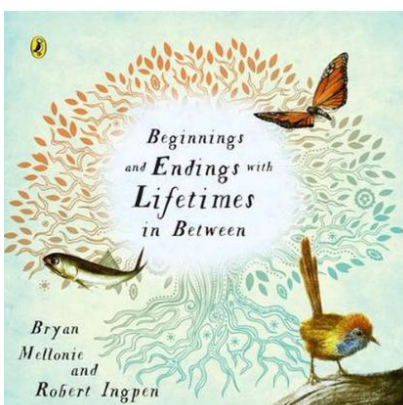
Sad Book

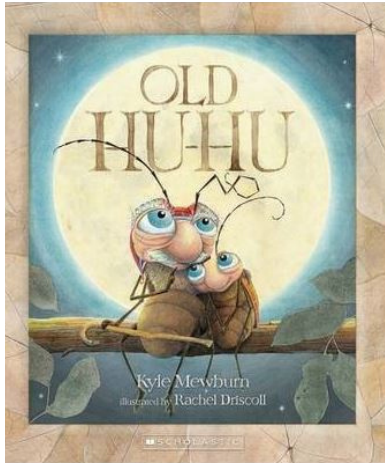

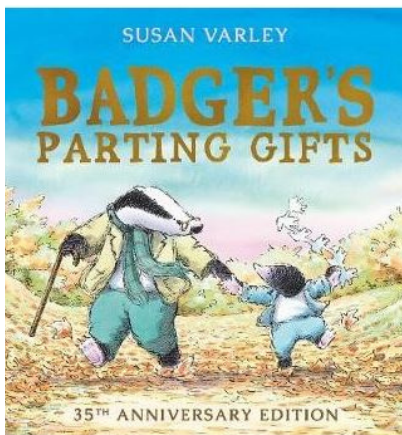


Old Hu-Hu

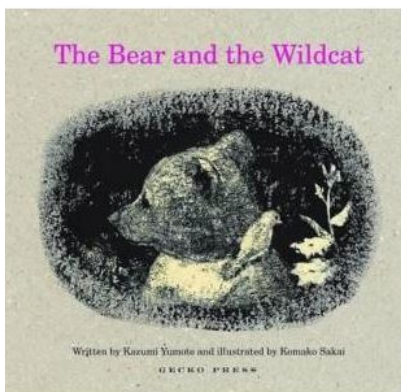


Badger's Parting Gifts

Kazumi Yumoto

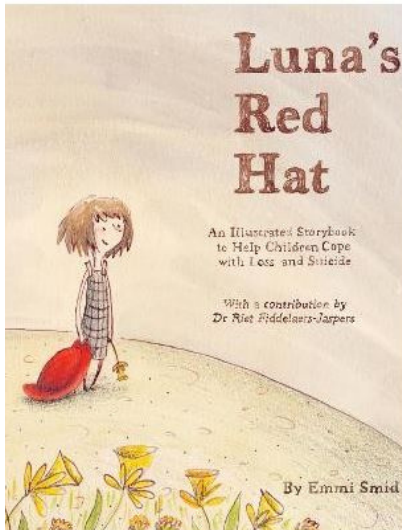

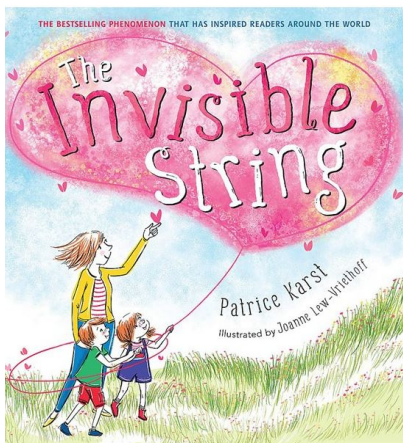
Luna's Red Hat

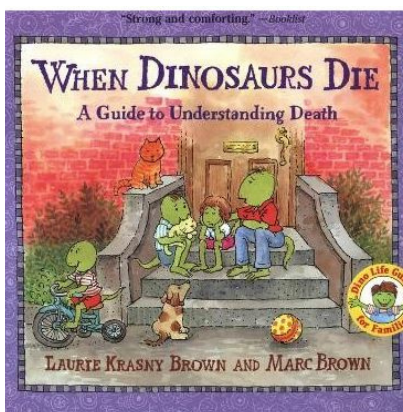


The Invisible String

Laurie Krasny Brown and Marc Brown

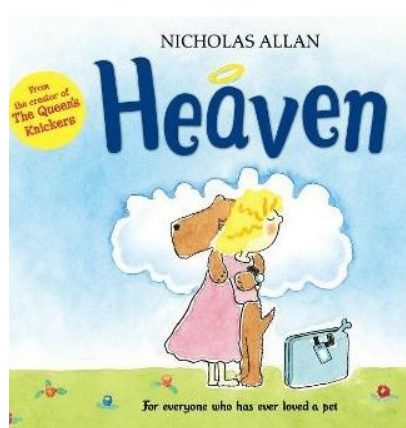

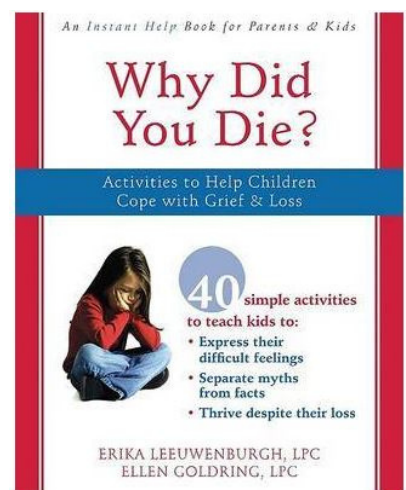


Heaven

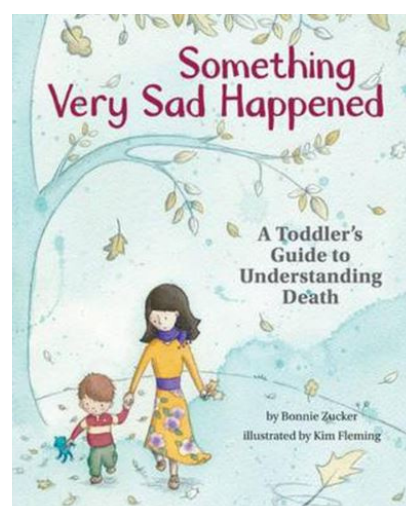


Why Did You Die? 40 Simple Activities To Help Children With Grief

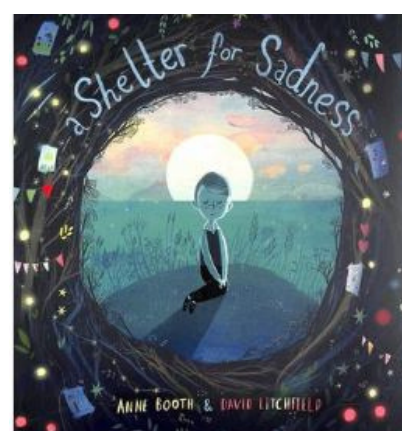


Thea and the Dizzy Waggle

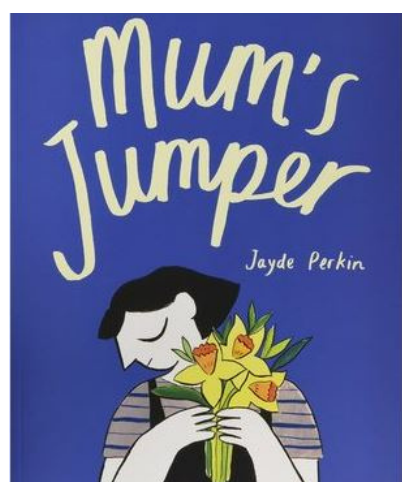

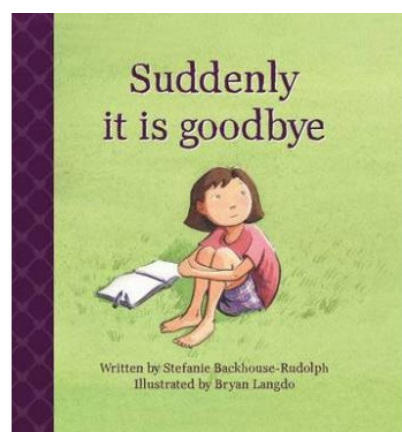
Mum's Jumper
